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
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# There's Something Refreshing About This Analog Short Film




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A swirling short depicts old phenakistoscopes, proto-cinematic devices that spun to create the illusion of a moving image. Motifs of dancing frogs, farmers, people in powdered wigs, and various other intricate symbols remind viewers of the early days of film, telling a humorous story of classicism. Directed and created by <a href="Pask DAmico">Pask DAmico</a>, a.k.a., Mr. Plesha, and scored by <a href="Al-Maranca">Al-Maranca</a>, it honors Joseph Plateau, a Belgian physicist who eventually played a part in developing the phenakistoscope.

The film begins and ends on a stop-motion created with a 19th century paper toy set. "L'ILLUSION DE JOSEPH", AMAZING SHORT ANIMATION BY PASK D'AMICO

Today I want to present a stunning short animation created and directed by the Italian Pask D'Amico (Pasquale D'Amico) for Klesha Production.

Some time ago, Pasquale came across the phenachistoscope (also known as phantasmascope or phantascope), an antique optical instrument that displays animated images, invented by Joseph Plateau in 1832. On the Internet he found the scans of these nineteenth-century beautiful images with patterns and drawings in movement, and he started to experiment with digital animation. After some attempts Pasquale started to combine these animations, trying to create something original and unpublished. Then, to stay on topic he created a stop motion with nineteenth-century paper toys that open and close the video. Music is by musician Al Maranca.

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### Joseph's Illusion: A Tribute to the Inventor of the Phenakistoscope

Ever heard of the Phenakistoscope? You have probably seen one in action at some point even if you can't remember (or, frankly, pronounce) its name. The device, invented in 1832 by Joseph Plateau demonstrated the illusion of a moving image using the persistence of vision principle (that's where multiple images blend in to a single image – in our minds at least). To do this Plateau used counter rotating disks with repeating drawn images in small increments of motion on one and recurrently spaced slits in the other.

Pask D'Amico at Klesha Production is fascinated by the old methods of animation and recently found scans of a number of them on the internet. This precipitated a successful attempt to digitally animate them. To give it a story, as it were, D'Amico then created a stop motion with paper toys from Plateau's era that open and close the video. The result? Fascinating, charming and pretty addictive – just try and stop watching this once it's started!


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
